Creation's Psalm: Jubilation (a take on Ps. 51:6, 10-12)

From the eyes of Creation,

From the heart of Creation,

Many: Thanks be to you, God of our hope!

One: For the ones who write and sing and paint and dance, who bring beauty and wonder,

Many: Thanks be to you, God of our hope!

One: For the children and youth who march and speak out, who challenge us, and who take the powers and principalities to court,

Many: Thanks be to you, God of our hope!

One: For the ones who live every day in any way they can to call unjust systems to accountability; and the ones who, in any way they can, try to heal and create spaces for life to flourish,

Many: Thanks be to you, God of our hope!

One: And for the One who through his embodied love leads us in defeating death and hopelessness, whose Spirit never leaves us, and who is now, and always will be, joining with us in the celebration,

Many: Thanks be to you, God of our hope!

All: Amen!

Prayer of Celebration

One: It's Easter, and we're at the empty tomb with all the others.

Many: Let's celebrate!

One: In wonder and awe and curiosity tinged with grief (or maybe the other way around), we're at the tomb together.

Many: Let's celebrate!

One: Through time and space, we share with others in this place of possibility and new life.

Many: Let's celebrate!

One: In this sacred space of this community, in the sacred space of God's web of life, let us celebrate the power of embodied love. Rejoice!

All: Amen!

The final word is not evil, but goodness.

The final word is not death, but life.

This is true! What cause for celebration!
