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Opening Words

For nearly 30 years, the United Nations has been bringing together almost every country on earth for global climate summits. The upcoming Glasgow summit (or COP26) will be the 26th conference. And it is not just one more international summit. Most experts believe COP26 has a unique urgency. Many believe this summit is the world's last best chance to get runaway climate change under control.

Back in the Paris summit of 2015, in a momentous happening, every country agreed to work together to limit global warming to well below 2 degrees and aim for 1.5 degrees, to adapt to the impacts of a changing climate and to make money available to deliver on these aims. This was the Paris Agreement.

Under the Paris Agreement, countries committed to bring forward national plans setting out how much they would reduce their emissions. Each nation agreed that every five years they would come back with that updated plan reflecting their highest possible ambition at that time.

Even with that momentous commitment that was the Paris Agreement, is was not enough. The commitments laid out in Paris did not come close to limiting global warming to 1.5 degrees, and the window for achieving this is closing. The decade out to 2030 will be crucial.

Countries must go much further than they did even at that historic summit in order to keep the hope of holding temperature rises to 1.5 alive.

COP26 needs to be decisive. The conference has outlined goals – phasing out of coal, moving to renewables, curtailing deforestation, restoring eco-systems, building resilient infrastructure and agriculture, and having wealthy nations and international financial institutions paying their fair share in the financing of this, just to name a few.

We are indeed living in the "fierce urgency of now."

Time is short, but there is still time.

This summit is the crucial tipping point for our ability to rein in environmental disaster and the ongoing destruction of God's good Creation.

Reader One:

And when our delegations return home to their nations, we will be there, candles lit in our hearts and minds, hope flowing from open hands that will do the hard work of restoring this good Creation.
